## **Mandarin Immersion Camp: Ages 3-5:**

### **Language Immersion**

Chinese American International School, the leader in bilingual Mandarin-English education, offers this unique language immersion summer camp for children ages 3-5. Your child will learn Mandarin in an activity-based camp under the instruction of our own highly experienced teachers. **No prior Chinese language skills are necessary to participate in this camp, but all participants must be at least 3 years old at the start of camp.** Children will be separated by language, as well as age, to ensure that every child gets the most out of his or her experience.

**Curriculum:** During each four-week session, children will experience Chinese language and culture through activities such as singing, Mandarin story time, Chinese dance, arts and crafts, cooking, and morning exercise. Language acquisition will come naturally to your child(ren) as a result of their participation in these fun, immersion-based, activities. Teachers will speak in Mandarin while using supplemental gestures, making it easy for the children to understand the tasks at hand. Simple Mandarin phrases will be learned from everyday use, such as saying “hello” every morning or “good bye” every afternoon.

\*Please note that campers must be three years old and potty trained by the first day of camp.

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## **Mandarin Immersion Camp: Ages 6-13**

### **Language Immersion**

Chinese American International School, the leader in bilingual Mandarin-English education, offers this unique language immersion summer camp for children in grades 1-8 (entering these grades). Your child will learn Mandarin in an activity-based camp under the instruction of our own highly experienced teachers. No prior Chinese language skills are necessary to participate in this camp. Students will be separated by language ability, as well as age, to ensure that everyone gets the most out of his or her experience. Please review page 6 for a brief description of each language level and the expectations our teachers have for students of each level.

**Curriculum:** During each four-week session, students will experience Chinese language and culture through a wide variety of traditional and cultural activities such as singing, Chinese calligraphy, Chinese brush painting, arts and crafts, drama, or martial arts. (Please see Cultural Enrichment flyer for additional information.)

Language acquisition will come naturally to your child(ren) as a result of their participation in these fun, immersion-based activities. More advanced students will be challenged to enhance their language skills through a more intensive level of interaction with teachers and other students. Teachers will focus on building students' confidence in speaking Mandarin outside of the classroom situations. (Please see Class Descriptions for more detailed curriculum descriptions.)

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## **Mandarin Immersion Camp: Ages 6-13**

### **Description of Summer Camp Classes:**

#### **Beginning level:**

Students at this level either have no previous exposure to Chinese or have very limited knowledge of Chinese. They can usually recognize less than 50 Chinese characters. They are either unable to communicate in Chinese or able to communicate in isolated words, lists of words on the topics related to daily life or personal experience.

#### **Low-intermediate level:**

Students at this level have been exposed to Chinese consistently for more than one year. They can recognize more than 50 Chinese characters and write some Chinese characters. Students generally respond to simple question on the most common daily life topics such as greetings and self-introductions. Students are generally able to converse in isolated words, lists of words, memorized phrases, and fragment discourses and have difficulties to generate a complete sentence on their own. Students at this level should have basic knowledge of content including numbers, colors, animals, and family members.

#### **Intermediate level:**

Students at this level have been exposed to Chinese for more than one and one half year and recognize more than 100 Chinese characters and write simple Chinese characters and phrases. Students participate in simple and direct conversation related to daily activities and personal experience. Students are generally able to communicate in formulaic sentences. Students at this level have knowledge of content including application of numbers (time and calendar), colors, animals, family members. weather, seasons, food, time, and places.

#### **Upper-Intermediate level:**

Students at this level have been exposed to Chinese consistently for about two years and recognize 100 Chinese characters or more. Students can obtain and give information in simple and direct conversation on topics related to daily activities and personal events. Students are generally able to communicate in non-formulaic sentences and can combine language elements in sentences and produce strings of sentence. Students are able to read and write in simple sentences in Chinese. Students at this level have knowledge in the content area such as application of numbers (time and calendar), colors, animals, family members. weather, seasons, food, time, and places.

#### **Advance level:**

Students at this level have been exposed to Chinese consistently for more than two years and recognize more than 150 Chinese characters. Students can participate in conversations in most informal and some formal settings on topics of personal experience. They are usually able to converse in non-formulaic and longer stretched sentences. Students are able to narrate and provide descriptions in logical time frames. They can generally read and write paragraphs. Students at this level have knowledge in content areas and in addition to the previous level, dining, shopping, and dining.



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## **Mandarin Immersion Camp: Ages 6-13**

### *Intro/Beginning Level Class Curriculum Description*

#### **Chinese Language**

- Essential daily conversation skills: e.g., hello, thank you, good-bye
- Expand vocabulary skills so that students can address their teachers, classmates and family members
- Learn to identify body parts in Chinese: e.g., head, eye, mouth, ear, eyebrow, shoulder, hand, foot
- Learn the colors: e.g., red, black, blue, yellow, green
- Learn how to count from one to ten
- Practice rhythms to improve tonality and accent
- Emphasize memorization through singing songs
- Learn beginning characters: e.g., sun, moon, big, small
- Introduce writing strokes and stroke order
- Games

#### **Chinese Reading**

- Introduce the development of Chinese characters
- Familiarize students with the rules of creating characters
- Introduce the radical of characters
- Character development from pictograph to simple radical characters
- Composition of Chinese characters
- Read short stories, children's rhythms, poetry, ancient legends and myths
- Chinese Workbook 1

#### **Chinese Math**

- Learn how to count from 1-100 in Chinese
- Understand the terminology of Chinese mathematics
- Exercise mental math skills
- Learn to use an abacus, understand the historical context of the abacus in Chinese culture
- Application of numbers: phone number, dates, and measurements



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## **Mandarin Immersion Camp: Ages 6-13**

### *Intermediate/Advanced Level Class Curriculum Description*

#### **Chinese Language**

- In-depth instruction in daily conversations and classroom etiquette
- Ability to introduce one's self: e.g., name, age, how many people in the family
- Continued study of simple phrases and Chinese sentence structures
- Learn terminology for dates: year, month, day, week
- Learn how to read and say the time: e.g., hour, minute and second
- Learn weather related terminology: e.g., sunny day, rainy day, cloudy day
- Learn vocabulary to give directions: e.g., up and down, east, west
- Learn some of the common animal names: e.g., cat, dog, horse, cow
- Introduce simple characters: e.g., pronouns, yes, no, good
- Continue to explore sentence patterns and idioms
- Re-enforcement of writing skills and ability to identify radicals

#### **Chinese Reading**

- Read short stories
- Recite poems and rhymes
- Develop vocabulary to describe readings
- Tonal practice
- Student Workbook 2

#### **Chinese Math**

- Learn to count from 1-100 in Chinese
- Familiarity with terminology of Chinese math
- Re-enforce mental math skills
- Learn to use an abacus and understand the historical context of the abacus in Chinese culture



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## **Mandarin Immersion Camp: Ages 6-13**

### **Cultural Enrichment**

The following is a sample of the cultural enrichment classes campers will have the opportunity to experience. All students participating in our full-day program will have the chance to participate.

#### **Brush Painting Class**

In this class, students will have an exceptional chance to explore the unique qualities of Chinese visual art with Feng Chen, a highly experienced Chinese art teacher trained in both traditional Chinese and Western art. Emphasis will be placed on the simple pleasure of making images, while learning basic skills in Chinese painting, calligraphy, the use of Chinese ink, color, Xuan paper, and special brushes. The instruction will include an introduction to special characters that represent the spirit of Chinese culture.

#### **Chinese Gymnastics**

Our Chinese gymnastics program offers physical education in the form of gymnastics. In this class, campers will have the opportunity to gain and build:

- Confidence • Spatial awareness • Body control • Balance • Strength • Flexibility
- Rhythmic movement • A healthy attitude towards fitness

#### **Chinese Cooking**

This is one of our campers favorite classes. Campers will have the opportunity to learn to make, Dumplings, Green Onion Pancakes, Egg Rolls, and many tasty desserts.

#### **Chinese Arts and Crafts**

Our campers will experiment with a variety of media to expand their knowledge of art and art theory. Having the Asian Art Museum as our close neighbors allows us every opportunity to visit the various exhibits.

Please note that \$100 per session will be discounted if all forms are in and tuition is paid in full by March 5.

A Late Processing Fee of \$100 will be charged if registration fee is not recieved by May 7.

**Reduced Tuition Available:** Applications for reduced tuition will be accepted and reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Anyone applying for reduced tuition should submit a letter requesting consideration. This letter will be reviewed by the Director of Summer Programs and Head of School (and/or the school's CFO). To apply for reduced tuition please submit the following items, Summer Program registration form, letter requesting tuition reduction, and supporting documentation exhibiting financial need. All requests must be received by March 5.

**Please Note:**

- Students signed up for the Afternoon Care Plan B must be picked up by 4 p.m. The family of any student on that plan who is not picked up by 4 p.m. will be charged the daily rate (\$24) for that day. If student is picked up after 6 p.m. a late fee will be charged. (See details below.)
- Extended Day ends at 6 p.m. If a student is not picked up by 6 p.m., the parent will be charged a late fee of \$20 plus \$1 per minute. For example, pick up at 6:05 p.m. will be charged a \$25 late fee.
- Each of the Extended Day plans are for that session only. No money will be returned for unused hours. Drop-In Care will be billed at the end of the session.
- For families of PK-K students enrolled in a half-day day program, please keep in mind that dismissal is at 12 noon and lunch begins at 11:30 a.m.. Therefore, please provide your child with a lunch.
